It is a sincere honor to step into the role of Executive Director at Family Resource Navigators, an organization that has been part of my life as a parent, volunteer, and staff member.

I first want to recognize our outgoing Executive Director, Eileen Crumm, whose vision guided FRN's transformation from a small program in one room into an independent nonprofit organization with more than 25 staff members who collectively speak 14 languages and support over 2,500 families each year. That growth lives in every family connected to services and every parent who finds their voice.

My own journey with FRN began as a mother seeking support for my two children, who both have additional needs. Like so many others, I came looking for information and found genuine connection instead. Over time, I became an IEP mentor volunteer, joined the staff as an FRN CCS navigator, managed our Early Start program, helped launch our Family Empowerment Center, and most recently served as Director of Finance and Operations. Each stage of my journey has deepened my belief in the power of family-centered support and community leadership.

As the parent of two children with disabilities, I remain connected to the lived experiences across Alameda County. My leadership in PTA and PTO, and my service on the Board of the Regional Center of the East Bay, have strengthened my resolve to ensure that families of all backgrounds have a voice in the systems that affect their lives.

What inspires me most is how our diverse staff help families navigate complex systems of care while connecting them to inclusive community opportunities — because belonging matters as much as accessing services. Every day, I witness families, self advocates, staff, and partners building strength and working together so children and adults with disabilities can reach their fullest potential.

I am humbled by this opportunity and energized by what lies ahead. Thank you for your trust as we build on this foundation together.

Supported Decision-Making

Launched new new multi-lingual & accessible website with 10 training modules for adults with disabilities and their families

Supported Decision-Making (SDM) reveals something powerful: young adults with disabilities don't have to choose between getting help and having a voice in their own lives. More families are recognizing that their child has a legal right to independence — to make choices and take reasonable risks just like everyone else.

For immigrant families in particular, SDM can be a lifeline. It offers legal protections for young adults without requiring families to navigate a court system that can feel inaccessible or unsafe. SDM isn't the right fit for everyone, especially those with more complex cognitive or mental health needs, and families need to choose what works best for them. Starting early makes all the difference. When decision-making goals are woven into a child's IEP, they grow up practicing the skills SDM requires. By the time they reach adulthood, it isn't a new concept — it's already part of who they are.

Multicultural Leadership

With the support of the Department of Developmental Services, FRN trained parent leaders from Arabic and South Asian communities – Hindi, Punjabi, Tamil, Telugu, and Urdu speakers – to navigate systems, advocate for their children, and become ambassadors within their own communities.

These are families of children with developmental disabilities in Alameda and Contra Costa Counties who have historically accessed Regional Center services at less than half the rate of English-speaking counterparts.

Staffed with coordinators who share the language and lived experience of participants, every participant who completed the training developed a plan for systemic advocacy — and many went on to attend Regional Center board meetings, IEP meetings, and legislative advocacy events in Sacramento with a newfound confidence.

I Can Pretty Much Handle It All

Daoud's Story

My name is Daoud Stevenson. I'm 22 years old. I like to play video games, hang out with friends, and I'm working toward a career in the culinary arts — preferably as a chef.

Transitioning into adulthood has been up and down, to be honest. What's going smoothly is my perseverance. What's been challenging is just not having a very strong mind — yet. But I've noticed changes. I've become the one to initiate things, to push the progress forward.

One thing I've learned is that not all options are available at once — and that's okay. Recently, I wanted to buy four books from my local bookstore, but I could only get two. I did not like it. But in the end, I decided to buy two this week and two for another week. It feels good. I'm pretty confident.

When my class goes out for a community outing, I ask my classmates, "Where would you like to go?" I listen, gather ideas, and then I say — it's time to put it to a vote. That's something I've grown into.

Going to SF State was a little bit of both — exciting, but also a little underwhelming at first. But I like new things. New faces, new



classes, new teachers. Being at SFSU lets me appreciate all of that. And I learned that a couple of my teachers from my past also went to San Francisco State. That meant something to me. I learned that I wasn't alone.

When it comes to medical and financial support, I'm fine with it — unless I have a question. And when I practice supported decision-making, it does make me feel independent. It makes me feel empowered. It's amazing, really.

I can pretty much handle it all.

Daoud's story is a reminder that independence looks different for everyone — and that the goal is never to remove support, but to make sure young people like Daoud are the ones directing it.

With FRN's Supported Decision Making resources, young adults gain the tools to make real decisions, navigate real challenges, and step into adulthood on their own terms.

“As I look back over these 17 years, I thought about how much has changed, but also how much has stayed the same.

FRN maintains so many core values today as it did then: a focus on relationships and family; hiring and training community members who speak the same language and share the same culture as the families we serve; building the strength and capacity of family members and people with disabilities to advocate for themselves. These are important elements of FRN’s DNA.

I am so proud of all that we have accomplished together. We added staff to expand the number of people we can help, and expanded to include 12 more languages. We founded our own independent nonprofit which gave us the flexibility to create new programs to address the needs of our community: we helped families with special education and moved from a focus on young children to serving all families. Today, FRN partners with more than 2,000 families each year, helping build skills, navigate the system or advocate for what they need. We have built so many deep allies and supporters in the community who help us make real positive changes in people’s lives.

Tears of remembrance and pride marked my last day at FRN, but I know that the FRN community is strong and powerful and that I will always be part of that tribe.” - Eileen
